FDT Launched

The Financial Data Tool (FDT) was sent out on 17th August. The FDT, the second part of the Aid Information Map, asks DPs to provide information for:

- Aid instruments and how they map onto the PEAP and MTEF; and
- Financial information on planned and actual disbursements.

Peer Review process

Once the data from the Questionnaire and FDT has been processed, Development Partners will be asked to review the returns of their peers. Each reviewer will receive a pack of materials containing detailed information on a DP's initial thoughts for future disbursements in a sector, as well as background information on the specific sector, sectoral aid flows and the DP's historical involvement in that sector. The review will compare the DP's future sectoral plans against the characteristics specified as important for leading and actively engaged partners.

Reviewers will receive their packs in late October. There will be a workshop launching the Peer Review process in the fourth week of October.

Upcoming UJAS meeting

UJAS partners will meet on the 21st September to discuss their progress in completing the Questionnaire and FDT.

FAQs

"We have not signed up to the Uganda Joint Assistance Strategy (UJAS). Does that mean that we should not, or do not have to, fill in the Questionnaire?"

The Division of Labour exercise was agreed by the GoU and the LDPG. It covers all DPs in Uganda, not just UJAS partners. The institution completing the Questionnaire and taking part in the exercise does not need to be, or become, a member of UJAS or the LDPG. Increasing selectivity is a key objective of the Partnership Principles and the Paris Declaration, to which all DPs in Uganda have agreed.

"Should we include all our bilateral projects and activities or only the aid ones? Is the data you are requesting only about flows of resources that are official development assistance (ODA) or all official flows from your country or organisation (e.g. OOF) such as those disbursed by other government departments and agencies?"

We would like to capture all official flows coming into Uganda. This exercise is about assisting rationalisation of all official flows in relation to the GoU national policies and programmes. This is particularly relevant for bilateral organisations; you may wish to contact Embassy colleagues to check.

"Is the Division of Labour exercise binding?"

The exercise will be as binding as DPs and the GoU choose to make it. Both the initial and the revised sectoral preferences in the Questionnaire are in no way binding. They are only 'first thoughts' by a DP that will be refined both through the Peer Review process and then more importantly in the Sector Working Group discussions next year.
